Faith Date Selection

Faith date selection was based on the most common religious affiliations in our community. Based on the 2021 Statistics Canada Census, 67% of Aurorans have a religious affiliation, with the below being the top five religions observed in our community:

50.7% of residents identify as Christian

5.8% of residents identify as Muslim

2.4% identify as Jewish

1.3% identify as Buddhist

1.3% identify as Hindu

Awareness Date Selection

Awareness date selection was based on the below criteria:

- Dimensions of Diversity (Race, class, ethnicity, gender, immigration/refugee status, sexual orientation, Indigeneity, ability -including Mental Health-, age, culture)
- Awareness dates that help to educate and celebrate diversity and inclusion.
- Strategic Plan Pillars and Council approved Strategiesawareness dates that support these efforts.
- Traditional Events: historically recognized and programmed by the Town.

New Year's Day

The first day of the year of the modern Gregorian calendar. (International)

7 Christmas (Eastern)

The equivalent of December 25 on the Julian calendar. Many Orthodox Christians celebrate Christmas day on or near this date. (Orthodox Christianity)

24 Bell Let's Talk Day

Helping to raise awareness to address the stigma and challenges around mental health.

International Holocaust Day of Remembrance

Designated by the United Nations (UN), this day marks the anniversary of the liberation of AuschwitzBirkenau and commemorates the six million Jewish victims of the Holocaust and millions of other victims of Nazism. (International)

National Day of Remembrance of the Quebec City Mosque Attack and Action against Islamophobia

A day commemorating the Islamophobic attack that took place at the Grand Mosque in Quebec City, which took the lives of six people and seriously injured 19 others. The Government of Canada established this commemorative day in 2021 to honour the victims and express solidarity with the survivors of this tragedy. (Canada)

10 Lunar New Year

8 International Women's Day

Ramadan

Nowruz/ Persian New Year

This marks the first day of spring and is celebrated as the beginning of the new year by more than 300 million people all around the world.

World Down Syndrome Day

A day to raise public awareness of Down syndrome and the effective and meaningful inclusion and participation of all people with Down Syndrome.

22 World Water Day

Celebrates water and raises awareness of those living without access to safe water. It is about taking action to tackle the global water crisis.

Earth Hour

A global movement where individuals and businesses are encouraged to turn off non-essential electric lights.

25 Holi

The Festival of Colours that welcomes spring. Usually celebrated over two days with people throwing colourful powder and coloured water on each other. (Hinduism)

Purple Day

An international grassroots epilepsy awareness initiative where people are encouraged to wear purple to promote awareness.

29 Good Friday

Commemoration of the crucifixion of Jesus. (Christianity)

Easter

Commemoration of the resurrection of Jesus from death. (Christianity)

Earth Day aims to raise awareness and demonstrate support of environmental protection, with many events held around the world. (International)

National Day of Mourning

held annually in Canada on April 28, is dedicated to remembering those who have lost their lives, suffered injury or illness on the job or a work-related tragedy.

A day of giving thanks to the harvest and blessings of the previous year. (Canada)

Halloween is thought to have originated with the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain, though it shares important ties with various other celebrations from several faiths and cultures, including Día de los Muertos (or the Day of the Dead), All Saints Day, and All Souls Day.

International Day of Persons with Disabilities

Promoted by the UN, this day is to promote an understanding of disability issues and mobilize support for the dignity, rights, and well-being of persons with disabilities. (International)

National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women

This is a day to remember those who have been victims of gender-based violence and those we have lost. It is also a time to take action to prevent and respond to gender-based violence by remembering and learning from our past, listening to survivors and speaking out against harmful behavior. (Canada)

24 Christmas Eve

This is the evening before Christmas and is often observed with a long meal, usually with family, sometimes accompanied by other celebrations such as midnight mass. (Christianity)

25 Christmas(Western)

A holiday celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ. It is recognized as a public holiday in many nations around the world and is also celebrated secularly by many non-Christians. (Christianity)

Chanukah/Hanukkah

Chanukah, the Festival of Lights, is an eight-day Jewish holiday in celebrating the success of the Maccabean Revolt against the Seleucid Empire, and the liberating and rededication of Holy Temple in Jerusalem. Begins at previous sundown and ends January 2, 2025. (Judaism)

26 Boxing Day

The day after Christmas Day was traditionally celebrated as the day tradesmen and servants would receive gifts from their employers. (International)
